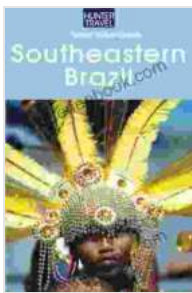


Exploring the Enchanting Coastlines of Rio, São Paulo, and Minas Gerais

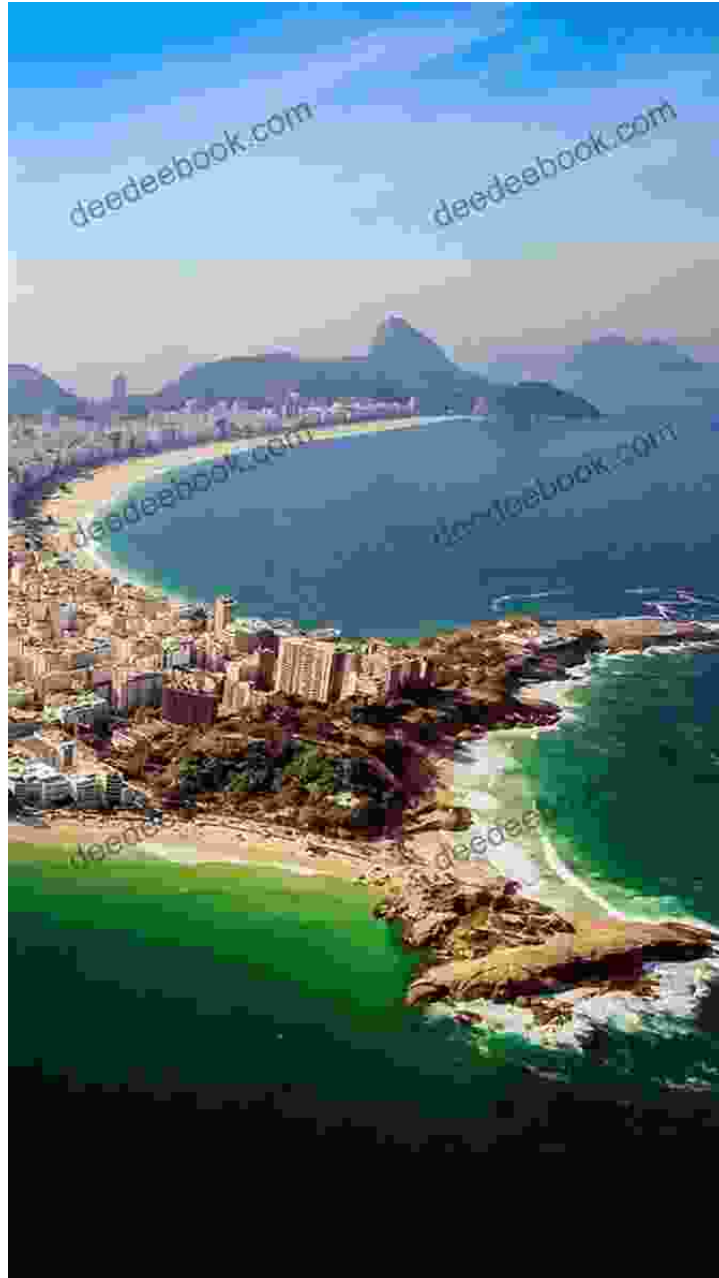
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Rio de Janeiro: The Sun Coast

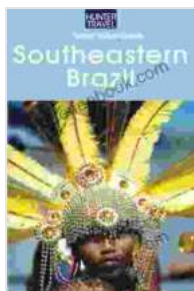

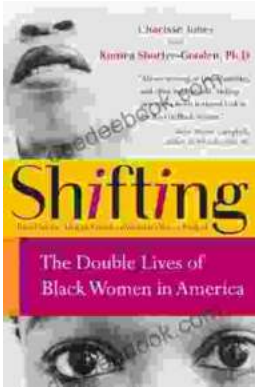
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
